Archaeology Word Wall

Zooarchaeologist: An archeologist who studies ancient animal bones

Sheep-Goat: Some sheep and goat bones are so similar that archaeologists can't tell the difference between them just by looking at them, when this happens archaeologists call the bone a sheep-goat bone until they can get it back to a lab to determine the difference.

Procedures

Archaeologist Log Book: What types of bones do you think we might find in Ashkelon?

Video 1: Pig Bone

Archaeologist Log Book: Draw/write about foods that you eat that have bones in them.

Video 3: Lion's tooth

Archaeologist Log Book: Draw a picture of a tooth from a very old animal. Draw a picture of a tooth from a young animal.

Bones tell us:

- the sorts of foods eaten during this time
- animals found in the area
- age of animals in the area
